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Limón Dance Company Announces 80th Anniversary Commission: Reimagining of *The Moor's Pavane* by Akram Khan

The **Limón Dance Company (LDC)** embarks on its largest choreographic commission to date in celebration of its 80th Anniversary season, a reimagining of José Limón's *The Moor's Pavane* by **Akram Khan**. Developed over a series of ten weeks in fall of 2026 and January 2027, Khan will reenvision a one-act version of Limón's choreographic masterpiece. Northrop at the University of Minnesota is the lead commissioner on the project with additional co-commissioning and development provided by Works & Process (in partnership with The Campus at Marlboro Music and Guggenheim New York). Early tour venues include: onStage at Connecticut College, Regina A. Quick Center for the Arts at Fairfield University, and Vivo Performing Arts (formerly Celebrity Series of Boston). "This incredible, timeless piece was a work I had come across and studied as a young performing arts student. And although that was so many decades ago, it has remained with me and still schools me today. Most simply put, I realized even then that the work was about the human condition, in all its flaws and weaknesses. And though this work is short in length, I have always felt it to be an epic sweeping gesture of comment on our sense of who we are not, rather than who we are. And so, I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to be inspired again and now to reimagine this work, through my current artistic lens.... As not to take away from Limón's original version, but instead, to pay homage to a work that has inspired so many artists over many generations. Bringing together the voices of my creative collaborators, Zeynep Kepekli (lighting designer), Aditya Prakash (composer), and the incredible artists of the Limón Dance Company, I am looking to create an emotionally physical experience that echoes the past yet expresses the present," said Akram Khan.

The story of Giraldi Cinthio's 1565 "Un Capitano Moro," adapted by Shakespeare as *Othello* is a chilling tale of race, power and jealousy. José Limón further distilled this story to four characters and the infamous handkerchief in his classic *The Moor's Pavane*. Limón's work, first performed in 1949 at the American Dance Festival, is one of his crowning achievements, and the work continues to be performed by the Limón Dance Company and the most well-known ballet companies around the world. Reexamining the themes of this work in a contemporary context reveals a connection to over 500 years of storytelling.

"Because the story of Akram Khan and the story of José Limón parallel and intersect in too many ways to ignore – Akram and I have been dreaming about how and when to work together since I was named Artistic Director. For me, this project brings together two of the greatest choreographers, bridging conversations across time, generations, and continents. *Othello* and

subsequently *The Moor's Pavane* illuminates the enduring struggles of overwhelming passion and crippling jealousy—forces that continue to shape us today and allow us to deeply dive into the human experience. I can't think of another contemporary choreographer better suited to honor this lineage with the depth, rigor, and integrity it deserves during our 80th Anniversary.” - Dante Puleio

In 2026 the Limón Dance Company is celebrating its 80th anniversary and five years of leadership from Artistic Director Dante Puleio, who took the helm in 2020 just as the dance world went into lockdown. Puleio's artistic vision pairs new commissions by brilliant contemporary choreographers with radical revivals of legacy works by José Limón and his mentor Doris Humphrey. Five years later, we have celebrated 6 world premieres, 10 acclaimed reconstructions of iconic dances, 2 historic museum installations celebrating Limón's contemporary impact, and our first Bessie Award in twenty years. The success of his approach has emphasized Limón's importance in today's world, showcasing how legacy work can speak across generations when it is contextualized for today's audiences

Like Limón, Khan has a track record of creating generation-defining works of art by reimagining classic works through a contemporary lens. Khan's *Giselle*, for example, has become a timeless, groundbreaking masterpiece. His deep examination and recontextualization of well-known works, underscores the relevance of familiar stories, offering audiences a renewed sense of understanding of the human condition. This project provides the opportunity for Khan and Limón to be in conversation with one another across decades and generations. There is no living choreographer who shares such similarities to Limón as Khan. Bringing them together on one program threads together the foundational work Limón did in the mid-twentieth century to the visionary and forward-thinking direction Khan is taking contemporary dance today.

Limón's status as an immigrant who became known as the greatest male dancer of his time and one of the most prolific choreographers of the 20th century parallels the life and career of Akram Khan. Khan's unique perspective, in-depth storytelling, and era-defining dance making continue to expand what is possible in the dance field and further Puleio's mission of ushering Limón's legacy into the 21st century. Limón was the first ambassador of the arts in any medium; he toured the world several times, bringing his company and American modern dance to the far reaches of the world. This earned Limón many accolades and cemented his place in history. To continue to grow the Limón Dance Company's reach and innovation, the artists and new work we commission need to further Limón's legacy and match his impact on the field. Khan continues to do that season after season.

Akram Khan (he/him) is one of the most celebrated and respected dance artists of today. In 25 years he has created a body of work that has contributed significantly to the arts in the UK and abroad. His reputation has been built on the success of imaginative, highly accessible and relevant productions such as *Thikra: Night of Remembering*, *GIGENIS: the generation of the*

Earth, *Jungle Book reimagined*, *Outwitting the Devil*, *XENOS*, *Until the Lions*, *Kaash*, *iTMOi* (in the mind of Igor), *DESH*, *Vertical Road*, *Gnosis* and *zero degrees*.

As an instinctive and natural collaborator, Khan has been a magnet to world-class artists from other cultures and disciplines. His previous collaborators include the National Ballet of China, actress Juliette Binoche, ballerina Sylvie Guillem, choreographers/dancers Sidi Larbi Cherkaoui and Israel Galván, singer Kylie Minogue, indie rock band Florence and the Machine, visual artists Anish Kapoor, Antony Gormley and Tim Yip, writer Hanif Kureishi and composers Steve Reich, Nitin Sawhney, Jocelyn Pook and Ben Frost.

Khan's work is recognised as being profoundly moving, in which his intelligently crafted storytelling is effortlessly intimate and epic. Described by the Financial Times as an artist "who speaks tremendously of tremendous things", a highlight of his career was the creation of a section of the London 2012 Olympic Games Opening Ceremony that was received with unanimous acclaim.

As a choreographer, Khan has developed a close collaboration with English National Ballet. He created the short piece *Dust*, part of the *Lest We Forget* programme, which led to an invitation to create his own critically acclaimed version of the iconic romantic ballet *Giselle*. *Creature* is Khan's latest work for English National Ballet.

Khan has been the recipient of numerous awards throughout his career including two Laurence Olivier Awards, the Bessie Award (New York Dance and Performance Award), the prestigious ISPA (International Society for the Performing Arts) Distinguished Artist Award, the Fred and Adele Astaire Award, the Herald Archangel Award at the Edinburgh International Festival, the South Bank Sky Arts Award, and ten Critics' Circle National Dance Awards for his company, AKC. He was awarded an MBE for services to dance in 2005. In 2022, Khan was announced as the new Chancellor of De Montfort University, and he is also an Honorary Graduate of Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, University of London as well as Roehampton and De Montfort Universities, and an Honorary Fellow of Trinity Laban and The Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts. Khan is an Associate Artist of Sadler's Wells and Mountview Academy of Theatre Arts, London as well as Curve.

José Limón (Founder/Choreographer, 1908-1972) electrified the world with his dynamic masculine dancing and dramatic choreography. One of the 20th century's most important and influential dance makers, he spent his career pioneering a new art form and fighting for its recognition. Born in Culiacán, Mexico in 1908, he moved to California in 1915, and in 1928 came to New York where he saw his first dance program. Limón enrolled in Doris Humphrey and Charles Weidman's dance school and performed in several of their works from 1930 to 1940. In 1946, with Doris Humphrey as Artistic Director, Limón formed his own company. Over the next 25 years, he established himself and his company as a major force of 20th century dance. Limón created a total of 74 works, including *The Moor's Pavane*, *Concerto Grosso*, and *Missa Brevis*.

Founded in 1946 by José Limón and Doris Humphrey, the **Limón Dance Company (LDC)** has been at the vanguard of American Modern dance since its inception and is considered one of the world's greatest dance companies. Choreographer and dancer José Limón is credited with

creating one of the world's most important and enduring dance legacies— an art form responsible for the creation, growth and support of modern dance in this country. Acclaimed for its dramatic expression, technical mastery and expansive, yet nuanced movement, the Limón Dance Company illustrates the timelessness of José Limón's work and vision. The Company's repertory, which includes classic works in addition to new commissions from contemporary choreographers, possesses an unparalleled breadth and creates unique experiences for audiences around the world. www.limon.nyc
