Missa Brevis is Limón's tribute to the human spirit. In the work, Limón depicts the survival of faith in a war-torn society, the uneasy present and the hope of a better future. The work also demonstrates Limón remarkable awareness of the solitude of the indivudal while at the same time seeing the group as something much more than a mere aggregation of solitudes. Most importantly, he returns to his ever-constant theme of mankind (and womankind) as a creature of indestructible integrity. It is a memento to cities destroyed during World War II and to those unconquerable qualities in human beings that compel the sport to rise up in hope and to survive.

BIOGRAPHIES

José Limón

José Limón was one of the most prominent American choreographers in modern dance. His powerful choreography often focused on human drama, incorporating themes from literature, history or religion. Throughout his career, Limón worked to change the image of the male in dance and bring it to a new stature and recognition. Born in 1908 in Culiacan, Mexico, Limón moved to the United States with his family when he was seven years old. He became interested in dance at the age of twenty, after moving to New York City to study painting. He began his studies with pioneer modern dancers Doris Humphrey and Charles Weidman, and was soon invited to join their company. In 1946 he founded his own company. Limón is best known for his masterpiece, The Moor's Pavane, based on Shakespeare's "Othello." He choreographed over seventy-four other works, including The Traitor, The Exiles, There is a Time, Chaconne, Emperor Jones, Carlota, Dances for Isadora, and The Unsung. José Limón died on December 2, 1972. Today, the José Limón Dance Foundation continues his work through two entities: the Limón Dance Company, an international touring repertory company, and the Limón Institute, an educational and archival resource organization.

Daniel Fetecua-Soto

New York-based Colombian dancer, choreographer, educator and producer, Daniel has been a soloist member of the Limón Dance Company for ten years (2006-2016) dancing lead roles in José Limón's master pieces and has appeared as guest artist in Pina Bausch's Rite of Spring and Tannhäuser.

Mr. Fetecua is a master teacher of the Limón technique, reconstructor of Limón's repertory and Director of the Limón Professional Trainee Program. Daniel Fetecua is the founder and artistic director of two dance companies: Pajarillo Pinta'o, a dance company that preserves and promotes the Colombian traditional dances through dance performance, workshops and classes and D-Moves, a contemporary dance project that combines Colombian traditions, Modern Dance and German Tanz-Theater.

Longtime collaborator of Colombian composer and musician Pablo Mayor. Together, they have created "Amalgama and El Barrio Project" and the educational residency Cumbia For Kids/Cumbia For All. Since 2008 has work with Native-Choreographer DayStar/Rosalie Jones for her work "Wolf: A Transformation", from whom Daniel has the rights to the piece for the performance, preservation and promotion. Daniel is Member of Movement Migration an international collective of seasoned dance artists directed by Kim Jones. He is the producer and artistic director of LATITUDES DANCE FESTIVAL, a NYC based platform to promote and present Latin American and Indigenous companies and choreographers from around the world. Most recent project C.A.V.E.S with world renown dancer Blakeley White-McGuire is touring National and International in collaboration with local dance companies.

Kayla Farrish

Kayla Farrish/Decent Structures Arts is an emerging company combining filmmaking, storytelling, dance theater performance, and sound score. The company has been commissioned by Gibney Dance Inc (2020-2021), Louis Armstrong House Museum (2020), Danspace Project Inc (2019), Pepatian and BAAD! (2018), and beyond. Farrish has been supported by creative residencies including Gallim Women + Residency (2021), Gibney Spotlight: New Voices, Barysnikov Arts Center, Arts On Site (2020), Keshet Makers Space Experience, BAX Space Grant (2019), Pepatian Dance Your Future (2018), and Chez Bushwick (2017). Pieces sprouted outwards including "Black Bodies Sonata", "The New Frontier (my dear America)" evening length and film, "With grit From, Grace", "Spectacle" Film and Live Production evening length work, and anticipated "Martyr's Fiction" (2021) that continued to push boundaries of form, voice, scene, narrative in an array of cinematic mediums. In 2020-2021, she has been commissioned for choreographing and directing a range of films and live performance hybrids. Her work has been performed at venues like Judson Church, Danspace, Jacob's Pillow, New York Live Arts, Joe's Pub, BAAD!, film festivals, and beyond. In 2021 she created site-specific immersive, "Broken Record" duet commission, with Brandon Coleman for Little Island Festival, "Rinsing" short dance film, co-directed Melanie Charles "Y'll D'nt Care Abt Black Women" Film, Saul Williams' "People Above the Moon" Solo for The Motherboard Suites at NYLA, "Roster" Outdoor Concert Performance collaboration Four/Four Open Air Series with Melanie Charles, and Martyr's Fiction Feature Film. Daystar / Rosalie Jones

Daystar/Rosalie Jones (Pembina Chippewa-Cree) specializes in "native modern dance" as seen through the perspective of ancestry, cultural values and a lifetime of experience in North American Indigenous dance and story. She is recognized as a "pioneer" in the field, being mentored by Mexican American Choreographer José Limón. In 1980, Rosalie Jones founded Daystar: Contemporary Dance Drama of Indian America, now considered to the the first native (Indigenous) modern dance company in the USA. Thirty choreographic works include Wolf: A Transformation (Anishinaabe) and the scripted dance-dramas Legacy of the Dream and No Home But The Heart. Recent published writing includes "Dancing the Four Directions: The spirit of "Intuition" (Intellect Journals, 2017) which she wrote in collaboration with Elder Edna Manitowabi. In April, 2016, Jones received the First Annual Lifetime Achievement Award in Performing Arts from the Institute of American Indian arts, "in honor of her lifetime of creativity, inspiring others and service to the field". The Daystar Archive was created in 2004 at the UC-Riverside Special Collections. More information can be found daystardance.com

William Carlos Angulo

William Carlos Angulo (he/they) is a director, choreographer, playwright, and arts educator based in New York City. As a child, he learned funk and street styles before studying at Ballet Chicago and then on full scholarship at Hubbard Street Dance Center. His professional work centers the creation of culture, using music and dance to explore, express, and celebrate thirdculture identity. His works in dance and theatre have premiered in fifteen US states including Puerto Rico, as well as in Poland, France, Germany, Croatia, and Bosnia & Herzegovina. He has directed new musicals presented at Steppewolf LookOut Series, Ars Nova ANT Fest, and Joe's Pub at The Public Theater. He has choreographed at Goodman Theatre, Chicago Shakespeare Theatre, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Seattle Repertory Theatre, Marriott Theatre, PCLO, MUNY, and more. He co-created the musical theater training program at Goodman Theatre in Chicago and was an original instructor for Broadway Across Borders through the US Department of State. He created the NextGen Choreography Apprenticeship in partnership with Dance Lab New York where he mentors gifted, young choreographers.

He has choreographed for Grammy Award-winning recording artists like Breland, LOCASH, Florida Georgia Line, and more, and his choreography has been hash-tagged on TikTok and Instagram over 17 million times. He is currently co-creating two theatre pieces - HOMBRES and KING DAVID & THE APOCALYPSE - that center and celebrate queer Latine history. He is a proud member of Stage Directors and Choreographers Society (SDC) and the Alliance of Latine Theatre Artists (ALTA).
